FOR UNDERSTANDING, SEE LETITIA

If you see a tall, slender woman with long, dark hair, dashing around Council House, that's Letitia Maun, our indefatigable social worker who manages to squeeze a zillion responsibilities into each day. She is always busy, running so many programs with grace, good humor and, above all, compassion and understanding.

Letitia came to New York from the San Francisco Bay area with the intention of spending just one year here. She never left. She got her master's degree in social work from Columbia University, married, and had two daughters. About ten years ago she became the social worker for NCJW NY's Council Lifetime Learning members. "This



is an incredible place for older adults," she says. "I am very grateful that I can keep learning from the NCJW NY community."

Letitia's portfolio includes projects that were established before she came and many new ones that she created. The Helen Bloom LINC Program (Lunch, Interaction, Nurturing, and Companionship) is a longstanding program for people with memory impairment. It includes their caregivers, who are very important to the success of the sessions. LINC is offered three times a week and people come very regularly. Sessions last three hours and provide socialization, music, dance and art, and even pet therapy...plus a nice lunch. Twice a week, Letitia facilitates two bereavement groups for people who are suffering from the loss of a loved one. She also leads another support group for caregivers who are currently caring for a spouse or partner with memory impairment. She initiated the monthly Healthy Living workshops where speakers discuss subjects relating to maximizing the well-being of members as they grow older. Everyone is welcome at these programs.

Another of Letitia's responsibilities includes supervising and instructing interns from Manhattan Community College who come for two semesters of on-site training. She especially appreciates their energy and contributions to both the Hunger Program and the LINC program. In addition to structured programs, Letitia gives supportive counseling and referrals to Council members as well as to clients of the Hunger Program. And she keeps in touch with CLL members who are homebound and unable come to Council House. All this, and she finds time to attend conferences and seminars that keep her up to date with new developments in social work.

Although Letitia is at CLL only four days a week, she gets everything done with enthusiasm and because she just loves people. "I welcome any questions about our activities here at Council House," Letitia says. "I would be happy to offer assistance to anyone who wants it." Look for her in her office tucked in at the back of the Café or call her at 646-884-9471.

The Box Office is chaired by two dedicated CLL members, Barbara Gottlieb and Beverly Ruiz. They head a committee of volunteers who sell tickets, make calls to theaters, and send them names of those who will attend. Volunteers are always welcome to join the committee. They work flexible hours that best fit their schedules and they get first dibs on tickets. Barbara and Beverly invite you to stop by and join the committee. They will train you to do the job with ease.

Between them, Barbara and Beverly have been involved with the Box Office for over 30 years. Barbara came first, about 20 years ago, after she retired as a drama teacher at Norman Thomas High School on 34th Street. She grew up in Lowell, Massachusetts and moved to New York right after graduating from college in 1956. She started out doing programs for children, but she wanted to perform. As she couldn't get a cabaret license in New York, she worked in Union City, New Jersey. Later, in addition to teaching, she was also involved with the Center Stage Center run by the Actors Fund, and has appeared in documentaries about sexual harassment and ageism.

Beverly is a Brooklyn native but has called Manhattan home for 53 years. She is married and has a 43 year old son who lives on the East Side. She was a clothing buyer, had her own fashion business for 25 years and was an adjunct professor of marketing at three

colleges: FIT, Brooklyn Community College and New York Institute of Technology. She became a CLL member about 10 years ago and because she loves theater, she joined the Box Office committee.

Both Barbara and Beverly have worn many hats here at Council House. Barbara has worked on fundraising, was on the Board of Directors, been involved with the trip committee and is active on the CLL committee, as is Beverly. Beverly recently organized trips for members to Costco and has plans for further adventures this spring. In the past she ran the annual Health Fair. They both love to be involved here at NCJW NY.
